

## DISRUPTION AHEAD! AMES PUBLIC LIBRARY PREPARES FOR NEW CARPETING

After four million visitors and many busy feet, the Ames Public Library, 515 Douglas Ave., will soon be getting new carpet in several high-traffic areas.

"Even with being diligent with maintenance and swapping out damaged squares, it's time for a refresh," said Library Director



Sheila Schofer. "This is a big undertaking, and we appreciate the community's patience as we work to keep our library clean and inviting."

Starting in January and continuing as late as mid-March, there will be a multi-phase project to replace carpet in the Library's Adult Services and Youth Services main floors, study rooms, Teen Space, and Vestibule. The Library will remain open throughout the project, but parts of the building will be closed to the public during certain phases.

There will be times when different collections will be unavailable to the public. At those times, small, curated collections will be available in the Lobby. Library users will also be able to request and pick up holds, though processing may be slower due to shelves being inaccessible.

The IDEA Center, study rooms, and some meeting rooms will be unavailable during the project. A computer lab with printing and scanning station will be available. Watch for more information at www.AmesPL.org, or sign up for the Library's email newsletter at www.AmesPL.org/page-one-newsletter.

## Sign up for E-Notification to be alerted to Snow Ordinance

When the snow falls, it's important to move your vehicle if you park on a street that's part of a snow route. Snow routes are marked with red and white signs. All vehicles must be removed from snow routes when the snow ordinance goes into effect.

How do you know when the snow ordinance is in effect? One easy way to get notified is to sign up for e-notification on the City's website. Look for the brown e-notification button at www.CityOfAmes.org and check the "Snow Ordinance" box to receive an email.

Also, pay attention to local media, look for a red banner at the top of the City's website, or check City of Ames and Ames Police social media. The snow ordinance goes into effect when snow accumulations are 2 inches or more, but the best way to know if the snow ordinance will be in effect is to watch the weather!

# **Recycle Your Christmas Tree**

Don't let your Christmas tree end up in the landfill. The City of Ames provides free disposal of Christmas trees at the Parks & Recreation Maintenance Shop, 700 E. 13<sup>th</sup> St.

Trees can be deposited during daylight hours through Friday,

Jan. 31, 2025. All trees will be recycled into wood chips, which will be used in Ames parks. The Parks & Recreation Maintenance driveway will be marked with a sign. The tree stand, tinsel, and all ornaments should

be removed before leaving the tree for disposal.

# ENERGY Q&A

Q: I know that there are excellent electric vehicle (EV) charging options within Ames and that if I buy an EV, most of my charging is going to take place at home. What about a road trip? Can I count on EVs for long-distance travel? Is there adequate infrastructure out there on the road?

A: EVs are an increasingly reliable option for a road trip, though they currently may require a bit more planning than with a gas-powered vehicle. Charging infrastructure across the country is expanding rapidly, with many well-traveled routes equipped with fast-charging stations.

New federal initiatives like the National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure (NEVI) program are actively working to make charging more accessible. NEVI is investing in a nationwide system of convenient, high-speed chargers along highways, which will improve coverage and make road trips in an EV more practical.

Recently the Iowa Department of Transportation awarded over \$16.2 million to install 28 new electric vehicle direct-current. fast-charging (DCFC) stations along Iowa's interstates with a goal of ensuring that there is one fast-charging station every 50 miles or less along I-29, I-35, I-80, and I-380. Each of the selected sites are no more than one mile from the interstate and 

will include a minimum of four charging ports providing continuous charging of at least 150 kilowatts of power per port concurrently.

This first round of funding doesn't fully accomplish



that goal, but there will be four separate fast-charging stations on I-35 between Des Moines and the Minnesota border, including one in Ames. EV Gateway was one of the recent awardees of the competitive NEVI grant. They plan to install six DCFC chargers at exit 113 of I-35 in north Ames near the Quality Inn & Suites on 13th St. EV Gateway will install, own, and operate the chargers.

As more EV charging infrastructure is completed, whether spurred by the NEVI program or not, drivers will benefit from a more consistent and reliable EV charging infrastructure. This will help provide greater peace of mind when planning longer journeys.
