New Transportation Network Improves Traffic Signal Coordination

Pedestrians, bicyclists, and motorists who value efficiency when navigating Ames' streets will welcome the City's Intelligent Transportation System (ITS). Installation along Duff Avenue began in the fall and will continue along other major streets in Ames for several phases. The ITS project involves installing fiber optic interconnect between the traffic signals and key City of Ames buildings as well as upgrading traffic signal



equipment at certain intersections.

ITS is a traffic efficiency project that uses underground fiber optic interconnect to allow traffic signals to "talk" to each other and to a central office. Traffic signals use adaptive signal technology, which detects traffic volume and adjusts signal timing to optimize traffic flow through busy streets. Look for cameras attached near the traffic signals for intersections that feature the new connections.

"ITS transforms the entire transportation network by enhancing traffic flow and reducing idling," said Traffic Engineer Damion Pregitzer. "We are harnessing technology to optimize our busiest streets, and all users in our community benefit through cleaner, more efficient travel in Ames."

ITS uses real-time data and algorithms to optimize traffic signals and reduce congestion. More efficient traffic means less fuel burned and lower greenhouse gas emissions. The project, funded by a grant from Iowa Clean Air Attainment Program (ICAAP), will be implemented over several years to connect more signals together.

DROP-OFF RECYCLING CENTER CELEBRATES 1 YEAR

Resource Recovery Plant's self-service recycling center celebrated its first year of operation at the end of December. The program offers 24/7 drop-off recycling for cardboard, mixed paper, glass, certain plastics, metals, and food. The facility is located on the north side of Resource Recovery, 420 E. Second St.

"We continue to be impressed by the community support for this program," said Superintendent Mark Peebler. "Since we began in January 2024, we have continued to add more containers to match customer demand. Reducing waste and recycling are great ways to decrease your carbon footprint."

Public Budget Meetings Scheduled

The City of Ames began preparing for the Fiscal Year 2025-26 budget last fall with a series of internal staff meetings. Work continues throughout the winter months as each department's budget is reviewed internally prior to presentation to the Ames City Council. There are still plenty of opportunities to get involved.

In February, three meetings are planned for representatives of each of the City's departments to present an in-depth review of proposed budgets. All budget meetings will be held in the City Hall Council Chambers, 515 Clark Ave., and will be streamed on City of Ames Facebook and YouTube. The budget wrap-up will be held at 5:15 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 11. In a process that started last year, the Story County Auditor will send property taxpayer statements to all property owners on March 15. These statements will include the proposed property tax levy for the City, School District, and County, the reason for any increase or decrease in property tax collections, as well as the date and time of a public hearing. At this time, this public hearing is expected to take place at 6 p.m. on Thursday, March 20 and includes public comment.

The final budget hearing is scheduled for 6 p.m. on Tuesday, April 8. It will include a second opportunity for public comments. This hearing will occur during the regularly scheduled City Council meeting.

Like all Iowa cities, the City of Ames must submit its budget to the State of Iowa for certification by the end of April. Budget documents for the current fiscal year are posted on the City's website, and draft documents for 2025-26 will be posted by early February.

ENERGY Q&A

Q: Is the SunSmart solar project still producing energy? Can customers still sign up to support renewable energy?

A: Ames Electric's SunSmart community solar project celebrated its fourth anniversary in December 2024, and we're excited to have a full four years of clean, green energy production. Over these four years, the project produced 12.5 million kilowatt hours (kWh) of energy - enough to power close to 1,200 homes for a year.

This summer saw the addition of Sheep on the Go as partners in the "mowing" of the project with 50 ewes and their lambs living most of the summer on the site. In addition, Iowa State University honeybee hives were located near the project site to take advantage of the pollinator friendly plantings underneath the solar panels. We're excited to continue these agricultural partnerships into the next year.

SunSmart is about 75% subscribed, so there is still opportunity for Ames Electric customers to buy one (or several) "Power Packs" from the project. Each Power Pack represents the output of half of a solar module from the solar farm. Participants receive an on-bill credit each month based on the amount of energy produced.

The cost of each Power Pack is \$240. Since its inception,

solar farm participants have received a credit that has averaged about \$1 per month per Power Pack. The credit is higher in the summer and lower in the winter due to the amount of



solar energy produced. By purchasing shares or blocks of the solar farm's energy, customers directly support the generation of clean, renewable energy, reducing reliance on fossil fuels. Even renters can consider investing in SunSmart. If you move, the utility will buy back your Power Pack (at the current market rate).
