


'Ames in Focus' Podcast Offers New Platform for Information

To expand options for learning more about programs, services, and issues, the City of Ames invites listeners to explore the new podcast, "Ames in Focus." Every Tuesday, a new episode provides residents and listeners with updates on events, facilities, and programs of interest to those who live, work, or visit Ames.

"Podcasts are a popular and portable way to get educated about a range of local issues," said Bill Gebhart, with City of Ames Communication & Outreach Division and host of Ames in Focus. "We feature City of Ames employees from various departments with a range of expertise about everything from urban



forestry to recycling. We also include elected officials, volunteers, and partner agencies to share information about our community." On the first episode, Mayor John Haila reflects on his past seven years as the community's leading elected official. Mayor Haila also discusses the successes of 2024 and the priorities for Ames City Council in 2025. Future issues will feature a variety of topics including updates on City programs and upcoming projects.

Spring Hydrant Flushing Begins in March

Public Works crews will begin flushing rust from water mains beginning Wednesday, March 26, weather permitting, and continuing for approximately two weeks. Flushing typically takes place from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Each year, this program provides Ames residents with the safest and highest quality water possible. Flushing serves the following purposes:

- Dislodges and removes mineral deposits and sediments from the water mains
- Verifies the proper operation of fire hydrants and valves
- · Helps identify weaknesses in the water system
- Checks for closed valves and weak flows in the water system

During the flushing process, Ames residents may experience rust in the water, even when crews are not working in the immediate area. To avoid rust, follow these tips:



- Turn on cold water first to check for rust. This avoids drawing it into your hot water heater.
- If the water looks rusty, run the tap for one to two minutes until it clears.

PROJECT SHARE DONATIONS HELP AMES RESIDENTS

The Ames Electric Services Project Share program continues to be a success because of the compassion and generosity of utility customers. This winter season, through December 31, 2024, the program has been able to provide \$5,010 in assistance to 34 households. A simple way to share the warmth with those in need is to make a monthly pledge or a one-time contribution to Project Share.

The purpose of the Ames Electric Services Project Share program is



to solicit and accept contributions which are used to assist our lowincome customers. A committee appointed by the Ames City Council determines the permissible uses of the funds donated to the Project Share program. The committee has adopted guidelines to ensure that every dollar contributed is used to assist low-income customers.

All expenses incurred administering the program are covered by Ames Electric Services as a donation inkind. Mid-Iowa Community Action (MICA) assists the City of Ames in the administration of the program by determining eligibility of applicants for Project Share funds.

ENERGY QXA

Q: I've made several energy-efficient investments to my home this past year. Other than Smart Energy rebates, are there other incentives I should consider?

A: That's a great question and especially timely. It's everyone's favorite time of the year again—tax season! If you made any energy-efficient upgrades to your home or vehicle in 2024, now is the time to check if they qualify for tax credits. The federal government provides tax credits for the following energy efficiency investments:

Vehicle:

- New Electric Vehicle (EV) Up to \$7,500
- Used Electric Vehicle (EV) Up to \$4,000

Home:

- Heat Pump Air Conditioner/Heater Up to \$2,000
- Heat Pump Water Heater Up to \$2,000
- Weatherization/Insulation Up to \$1,200
- Geothermal Heating Installation 30% of qualifying costs (no cap on geothermal tax credits)

Power:

- Rooftop Solar Installation 30% of qualifying costs
- Battery Storage Installation 30% of qualifying costs
- Electrical Panel Upgrade Up to \$600

If you are wondering about your eligibility for tax credits, requirements depend on the improvement made and generally include:

- Meeting specific energy efficiency standards.
- Providing proof of purchase and installation.

Completing the



- upgrades between Jan. 1, 2024 and Dec. 31, 2024.
- Some tax credits are only for improvements to your primary residence.

For a full list of the requirements, visit the IRS Energy Efficient Home Improvement Credit website or Rewiring America: www.rewiringamerica.org/calculator. To claim these credits, fill out IRS Form 5695, "Residential Energy Credits" and/or Form 8936, "Clean Vehicle Credit" when you file your tax return.

If you're feeling unsure about how to file for these credits, a tax professional can help you understand what qualifies and guide you through the process. In the end, it's important to get the credit you deserve!
