

## Ames Animal Shelter Seeks Financial Support for New Facility

Exciting progress is underway for the Ames Animal Shelter! The vision of a new facility is even closer to reality with the recent purchase of property at 2715 Dayton Ave., the former location of Eagle's Loft Early Learning Center. Community support will be essential to make this transformative project a success.

The cost of the project is estimated at \$8 million. The Ames City Council has allocated \$3 million, and private donors have contributed an additional \$3 million. The Shelter is seeking to close the funding gap through financial donations.

Ames Animal Shelter employees and volunteers have always provided compassionate care for lost, abandoned, injured, and surrendered animals at the current facility at 325 Billy Sunday Road. However, its small size no longer meets growing demand for space and creates challenges for disease control and appropriate

animal housing. The new building will significantly expand functional space through a thoughtfully designed shelter focused on enhancing animal welfare. It will feature a dedicated annex for dogs, improved medical areas, and specialized spaces to reduce stress and promote wellbeing for every animal in its care.

The Ames Animal Shelter remains steadfast in its commitment to operating



as a No Kill shelter. Staff dedication to progressive, responsible animal welfare has allowed the shelter to place over 98% of animals into loving homes or reunite them with owners. The team works diligently with rescue groups, provides resources to pet owners to prevent unnecessary surrenders, and offers 24/7 lost and found pet reporting.

## WATER, SEWER RATES TO INCREASE IN JULY

Utility rates are anticipated to increase this summer, but there are things to do to make the higher rates less noticeable. Customers can expect a 3.5% increase in



water rates and a 5.5% increase in sewer rates effective for bills due on and after July 1, 2025.

The water rate increase is a reflection of

on-going operating costs and planned improvements. Major tasks in the next fiscal year include:

- A series of projects that increase the resiliency of the Water Utility to natural disasters by providing redundant power and equipment
- A renovation of the decades-old Technical Services Complex that is home to the Water Meter and Laboratory Services Divisions
- The continuation of an ongoing project to replace old, undersized water mains

The sewer rate increase will help finance planned

necessary improvements for the sewer utility, including:

- The completion of a \$62-million upgrade of the Water Pollution Control Facility to increase its nutrient removal capabilities and provide additional capacity for future growth in Ames
- A project to expand the Water Pollution Control Facility's ability to accept hauled waste from sources such as septic tanks, restaurant grease traps, and industrial wastewater
- The routine rehabilitation of the sewer collection system throughout the city

To minimize the impact, customers are encouraged to use City rebates and practice conservation. Reducing water use not only saves on the cost of water but on sewer as well. That is because for most customers, your sewer bill is based on your water usage. Regularly inspect your property and repair any leaks quickly.

Water use outdoors can be a great place to save. Inspect irrigation systems for frozen or broken lines and make sure heads are only delivering water to plantings that need water. Consider investing in a rain barrel to help with your outdoor watering and converting traditional turf into low impact, native plantings that need less water. (Read more ideas below!)

#### REBATES HELP REDUCE WATER USAGE

Are you considering upgrading your landscape? The SmartWatersheds cost-share program reimburses for native trees, native landscaping, lawn quality restoration, rain gardens, rain barrels, and composters.

Besides enhancing your landscape, you will reduce stormwater runoff and improve water quality of our waterways. You will also create habitat and food sources for pollinators and wildlife. These rebates can save natural resources, but they can also save money by reducing water bills. Planting trees can provide shade that over time can reduce electric bills.

Q: I'm an Ames Electric Services customer. What are the different options for purchasing solar energy? Are there local Ames solar installers? If I'm unsure about purchasing my own system, what can I do to support renewable energy?

A: Ames Electric Services provides customers with numerous opportunities to learn about and install solar home systems. Solar panel technology has drastically evolved over the last 30 years, and that has made solar energy an increasingly important and accessible way for individuals to commit to sustainable energy. Ames Electric Services customers have several ways to pursue solar technology for their homes.

Resources are available on the City of Ames website to assist in planning a solar installation. Among these is a list of reliable solar installers in the Ames area, federal and state incentives, and rebates (\$100 per kW of the system size) for Ames Electric Services customers.

Residents looking for options in place of a home solar installation should consider purchasing energy shares or "Power Packs" from the SunSmart Ames Community Solar Project. Owners of Power Packs receive monthly credits on their utility bill. Bill credits are based on the actual solar energy production from the solar farm. Each Power Pack provides up to a \$3 credit per month.

The community solar farm is located just south of Highway 30, and is capable of producing up to two megawatts of energy. Power Packs are still available for purchase at www. CityOfAmes.org/solar.

Fun fact from SunSmart Ames Community Solar Project: After an amazingly successful summer of 2024, sheep will again return to the solar farm in the summer months

to graze. Through targeted grazing efforts, the City reduced fossil fuel use associated with mowing the area. Additionally, by collaborating with researchers at Iowa State University's Department of Entomology, the site hosted honey bees, which served as a pollinator habitat and provided ISU researchers with honey!

As more solar infrastructure is installed around Ames, residents will benefit from diverse programs and targeted incentives to increase renewable energy generation throughout Ames.
